# **STEMSEL LCD Project 1 : Voltage Reader**

### **Problem**

The Liquid Crystal Display (LCD) is an elegant way to display information and values used by the microchips. But how can we use microchips and a LCD to display messages, voltages or other important information?

### **Background**

Liquid Crystal Displays or more commonly known as LCDs are used to display information, in a variety of applications. You can find LCD technology in a wide range of appliances from digital watches, microwave timers to laptop computers and television screens. The LCD is made from a glass base with Indium Tin Oxide (ITO) electrodes; however newer panels use Indium Gallium Zinc Oxide (IGZO) electrodes. The shape of the electrodes determines the images which can be produced when the LCD is on.




Figure 1: Exploded view of a 7-segment LCD


When there is no electrical current passing through the electrodes surrounding the liquid crystal, the liquid crystal solidifies and light is able to pass through to the mirror. The segments with electrical current will appear dark and enable a message to be displayed. Basic LCD displays use a mirror to reflect light and enable the message to be displayed, however LCDs used in monitors, televisions and other complex electronics use a backlight.

#### <u>Ideas</u>

What do we want to display? Is it a number or letters? Is it a voltage? Will the message fit on the screen?

# Plan

For our system we want to display a specific voltage. The voltage value can be determined in this case by a potentiometer; when the potentiometer dial is turned, the voltage will increase or decrease. This change in voltage will be displayed on the LCD panel and constantly update depending on the rate of change in dial value



## **Design**

Open the ezCircuit Designer and begin a new STEMSEL project. Add a LCD and a potentiometer. Note that when you have selected a component, slots that can be used for this component change from white to a light green.

The completed design should appear as shown below:




Figure 3: Circuit Design

### **Build**

Now that the design is complete, attach the black and red wires of the potentiometer to the negative (-) sign and positive (+) sign slots on the STEMSEL controller board. Attach the white wire to the C7 slot. Plug the LCD into the LCD port on the top of the STEMSEL controller board.




Figure 4: Circuit

#### **Programming**

With the design and assembly completed, we send the design to CoreChart to program the microchip. Make sure you hold down the push-button when connecting the STEMSEL controller board to your computer.

- 1. Start by clicking on the "LCD" in the panel and select "LCDFormat". Insert the icon under "START MAIN" by clicking on the arrow and by double clicking on the "LCDFormat". Then customize the Mode to "Return cursor home" with a Speed of "1/3s".
- 2. Click on "LCD" and choose "LCDMessage", double click on the new box and enter a message of your choice in the "LCDMessage".
- 3. Click on "LCD" and choose "LCDFormat", double click on the new box and customize the Mode to "Second Line".
- 4. Click on "LCD" and choose "LCDMessage", double click on the new box and enter a message of your choice in the "LCDMessage".

5. In order to complete the loop, we will require a GoTo icon. This can be selected in the Mode Icons panel. Click on the "Go To:" dropdown menu and select "START" and

click "Apply Changes".




Figure 5: Code

Now that we have made the LCD screen work and understand how to do it, let's create the program to measure input voltages from the POT.

- 1. Create a new file by selecting File/ New. In order to find the voltage produced by the potentiometer, we will need to get the data from the dial. Click on "LCD" and select "LCDFormat". Customize the Mode to "Return cursor home" and no delay.
- 2. Click on "Inputs" and select "Analog\_In". Double click on the box choose the dial as the input pin and save as "Volts".
- 3. Select "LCD" and choose "LCDMessage". Double click the box and type "Battery Voltage" in the "Message" textbox.
- 4. Click "LCD" and select "LCDFormat". Double click the new box and customize the Mode to "Second Line" and no delay.
- 5. Click "LCD" and choose "DispNumberLCD". Double click the box and select "Volts" in the number box. Remember to check the Voltage box and click ok.

6. In order to update the reading from the potentiometer, we will need to create a loop. Select the "GoTo" icon in the panel and place it just before the "END MAIN" icon.




Figure 6: Voltage Reader Code

# **Extension**
